

‘Let’s Give Ukrainian Children Another Christmas This Year, 2025’





Dear Supporters of the Plant and Hire Aid Alliance,

This is our fourth year of sending gifts to displaced Ukrainian children along the front line, and once again the support from colleagues and across the plant and hire industry has been remarkable. Although it has been a more challenging year to secure donations, we are still able to send 12,000 wrapped gifts thanks to the generosity of friends, colleagues, and supporters of humanitarian efforts in Ukraine. As in previous years, Rotary Clubs across Ukraine collected the gifts from Vinnytsia in central Ukraine and distributed them to schools, villages, orphanages, and families enduring hardship.

The war in Ukraine shows no sign of abating, despite the efforts of Western leaders to bring it to an end. Ukrainian families continue to face profound hardships as every aspect of daily life is disrupted. Millions have been displaced, separated from loved ones, and forced to rebuild their lives in temporary or unfamiliar surroundings. Many have lost homes, livelihoods, or family members, while children endure severely disrupted education and ongoing psychological stress. Damage to infrastructure, rising poverty, and limited access to healthcare compound their struggle. Yet despite everything, families across Ukraine continue to demonstrate extraordinary resilience. Today, 3.7 million Ukrainians remain displaced within the country, and a further 6.9 million are recorded as refugees abroad.

Many people, both inside and outside Ukraine, are experiencing fatigue as the war drags on. The constant stream of bad news has made it easy for some to switch off or look away. But it is precisely at this moment that Ukrainians need our support more than ever. We must not abandon them in their time of need. I hope colleagues will continue to spread the word about the invaluable work of the Plant and Hire Aid Alliance. We will keep providing aid for as long as people wish to send it.

We have already secured 40 pallets of gifts for our 2026 campaign, and we are incredibly grateful for the support so far. We warmly welcome any further help and hope that like-minded companies and individuals will continue to stand with us.

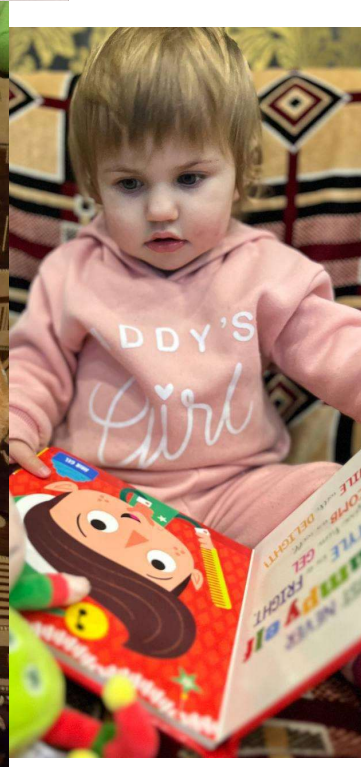


Kharkiv City Ukraine

Kharkiv remains actively affected by the war — including recent drone and missile strikes that have caused injuries and infrastructure damage in recent weeks. Russian forces have been reported to continue attacks on the city's energy grid and residential areas as part of broader pressure campaigns. Russian missile strikes on energy infrastructure on 5 January 2026 resulted in more than 350,000 people without electricity, with both emergency and planned blackouts now in effect.

Oleksandriya

On 15 April 2022, at 10:26 pm., two Russian missiles hit the infrastructure of the city's airport. In 2023, on Independence Day, the Memorial Alley of those killed in the Russo-Ukrainian war was opened





Kropyvnytskyi City

The city is accommodating 85,000 forcible displaced people because of the war. Various institutions and enterprises moved to Kropyvnytskyi because of the war including Donetsk State University of Internal Affairs from Mariupol (originally Donetsk), Kharkiv Research Institute of Prosthetics, Donetsk National Medical University from Kramatorsk (originally Donetsk) and Kherson State Agrarian and Economical University





Uzhhorod

As of early to mid-2025, Uzhhorod is hosting around 27,300 officially registered internally displaced people, including 8,500 children, 3,000 pensioners and nearly 900 people with disabilities. A further 5,000 or more are thought to be unregistered, living with relatives or renting privately. In total, the city may now be supporting over 30,000 displaced residents, pushing Uzhhorod's population to an estimated 130,000–135,000.





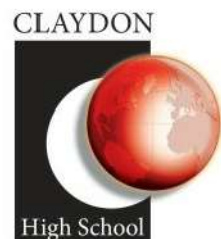
